To follow on from the introductory training, and our June Race Coaching, we run a fun series during July. Races are on three Sundays in July, 6th, 13th, 20th.

As ever, this series has a name;

Jolly July Series

Before we get to July, we have the last weekend of June to enjoy. This has a very different format from most racing days.

Saturday 28th June

We are racing on Saturday so that the Sunday is clear for the Open Meeting. Saturday is now going to have the STANDARD race series, Summer Stakes races 10, 11 and 12. The First race is 13:30 and is a 45 minute pursuit.

Novice Race

At the end of the afternoon, 16:05, we are to have a NOVICE race where any of this year's trainees are encouraged to sail. No special racing competence is required, apart from what you have already displayed during the courses in May. Coaching will be provided to encourage people around the course. Bring your sailing gear and a towel etc.

Barbecue

After racing has finished, the Barbecue should be up to temperature. (We have a fine selection of large BBQs to be fast enough for a large number).

Jolly July Series

The purpose of this series is to encourage people who have never raced before to take part in racing. The July racing isn't very serious, and we hope that lots of people of all ages and with all types of boats will take part.

Each week there will be a **BEACHMASTER**, who will be easily identified because he or she will be carrying an umbrella.

The first race will start at 1.30pm. The beachmaster will be at the OD hut by 1.15pm. He (or she) will watch the first race with you. He'll try to explain what the competitors are doing, and why. It will be a pursuit race, which is really the easiest type of race for novices to try, and he will explain the mysteries of a pursuit race.

At the end of the first race, all the competitors will come ashore. The beachmaster will allocate a partner to each novice. If you want to sail a double handed boat, we'll try to get a more experienced person to helm or crew the boat with you. If possible, the experienced member will sail with you in your boat. You may end up crewing for the more experienced sailor.

If you sail a single handed boat, we'll give you a partner. He (or she) will sail close to you, but behind you, and so will help you over the starting line and round the course. The race officer will decide the length of the race, and may run more than one race in this format.

The last race of the day will see all competitors in teams of two boats of similar speeds. Until the last lap, the experienced sailor will sail behind the new sailor, and will try to help you sail more efficiently. In the last lap, the experienced sailor will sail as fast as he can, if he wants. Each boat will be given a position, and the team that wins is the team with the best combined score.

We'll explain it on the day, and I hope everyone understands it then!
